Mrs. Kyle opened the meeting at 10:00AM.

### MONTHLY MEETING - POLICE CHIEF

Chief Walker was present for his monthly report (see attached). Chief Walker said Matthew Goehle graduated from the police academy. He said they have hired a new officer Adam Lawton. They will have another full-time officer coming in January and another two coming shortly thereafter.

Chief Walker said they had one employee test positive for Covid, so adjustments needed to be made. The Rockingham County Sherriff's office was very helpful during this time.

Santa's ride is tonight and will be escorted through every street in town by the police department.

### MEETING - RECREATION DIRECTOR

Katie Duffey was present for the discussion on the travel basketball. She discussed the situation on removing the travel teams and how it would affect the in-house league. Mrs. Brown said she is still not in favor of having the travel teams playing.

There was discussion on when the children have to wear masks. Mrs. Brown said the numbers are way up and 40 children were out of school and feels it is too risky to let the children back into the recreation center after playing at the RIM. She understands it is a choice for the parents on whether or not the child plays.

Mrs. Brown said she asked Ms. Duffey if either her or Patrick Collins would be present to oversee the guidelines, but parents are telling her that neither of them are in the building.

Mr. Manzi said that Ms. Duffey put together a list of what they are currently doing per the guidelines. If the board does not agree and wants to stop the programs, they just need to give him the direction and it will be stopped immediately.

Mrs. Kyle would like some more time to consider this and table it for this meeting until they have further information including input from the parents. Ms. Duffey said they have

already played for three weekends and will continue until the end of February.

### DISCUSSION - ROUTE 1 PROJECT & ROCKS ROAD

Chris Raymond from TEC was present to answer questions. He said they reviewed the site and identify what could be done to reroute the traffic on Rocks Road. There are two alternatives presented today that the board could consider.

There was discussion on the two alternatives presented (see attached). Alternative 1 would require getting permission and/or easements from NextEra. If this is the alternative that is the most feasible Mr. Manzi said they would need to reach out to NextEra for this project.

Mrs. Kyle asked if they are under any time restraints as they have been stretching the deadline for the Route 1 North project. Mr. Manzi said he will ask TEC to get them a cost estimate for the project as it would be a town project. Mr. Manzi said the DOT contact is out until the first week in January so the board could hold a special meeting or do it at the first meeting in January.

To approve the Route 1 North project with instruction to the town manager to move forward with the Rocks Road project.

Mr. Manzi said they are not fully committed to the project at this time it is just to enter into the first steps with the state for the project.

### WARRANT ARTICLES - COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Mrs. Kyle said she has no issue with Mrs. Brown voting on both articles as she was not present during the negotiations. Mr. Manzi said it would be to place and approve articles 3 and 4 and then to recommend both of them.

Mrs. Brown reminded everyone that the Santa ride is still on for tonight and will be leaving the fire station at 4:30PM.

Mr. Manzi said that John Starkey was at the last meeting and said they are doing their work with diminished resources due to Covid. He would like to open the transfer station on a one-time basis on the Sunday after Christmas to give the residents the ability to go to the transfer station.

Mrs. Kyle requested that residents with basketball hoops or anything else that hinders the flow for the plow trucks to put them away or push them back so the public safety vehicles can get through during the winter months.

Theresa A. Kyle MOTION: To open the transfer Second: Ella M. Brown station on Sunday, Motion passed 2-0 December 27 only.

### RECYCLING REVOLVING FUND

The board discussed the purchase of a packer type vehicle from this fund. Mr. Manzi said there are sufficient funds in this account to make that purchase. He feels it can be done the way they have made the purchase of the ambulance from the ambulance revolving fund.

MOTION: Ella M. Brown To make the purchase of Second: Theresa A. Kyle the packer vehicle from Motion passed 2-0 the recycling revolving fund.

# December 21, 2020 October (partial), November, December (partial) Report to Selectmen

- Ofc. Matt Goehle graduated from the 183<sup>rd</sup> full-time police academy December 18<sup>th</sup>.
- Ofc. Adam Lawton started as the newest full-time officer on November 30<sup>th</sup>. Ofc. Lawton is a
  United States Army veteran and a New England native. He is full-time certified as a law
  enforcement officer in North Carolina and is expected to attend the "law package" through NH
  Police Standards & Training as part of the 184<sup>th</sup> full-time police academy.
- Officers Mounsey & Houldsworth participated in the Recreation Department's Search for Santa.
- PowerDMS software purchased through the D'Alessandro account is now active and provides a number of benefits to the department for policy management and training.
- Officers are utilizing PowerDMS for the "classroom" portion of their annual firearms training which is a more flexible and efficient means of providing certain training especially when factoring in COVID-19 concerns.
- A new vehicle is currently being upfitted for our patrol fleet. This vehicle will replace an older vehicle.
- Officers are completing intoxilyzer recertifications. This is the machine commonly known as "the breathalyzer".
- We currently have conditional offers out to three candidates for vacant full-time patrol positions.
   We expect one candidate to start in January and two others are in the background phase. These three candidates will give us 27 full-time police officers.
  - We continue our hiring process to fill the two additional patrol positions approved by the voters in March which were effective December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020.
- We are conducting a hiring process to fill a vacant full-time dispatch position.
- The Chief attended a meeting with the Budget Committee as part of the 2021 budgetary process.
- 22 members of the Seabrook PD, including K9 Henry, are participated in the Beards for Bucks fundraiser to benefit the Child Advocacy Center of Rockingham County. The event raised more than \$80,000.00 for the CAC. Officers John Giarrusso and John Mounsey as well as Chief Walker were in the top ten fundraisers in the county, each raising over \$1,000.00 and Officer Giarrusso raising the most out of the Seabrook officers with \$2,670.00.
- Since our last update to the Board of Selectmen we had one positive COVID-19 case which
  resulted in multiple quarantines. While we had to make adjustments in our communications
  procedures during this time, we were able to continue providing the Town with the police services
  they've grown accustomed to. Thank you to Hampton PD and the Rockingham County Sheriff's
  Office for their assistance with communications during that time."

 Attended meetings on multiple platforms related to the COVID-19/coronavirus updates and related issues.

- Attended a virtual meeting for the Seacoast Emergency Response Team (SERT)
- Attended a meeting for the Rockingham County Chiefs of Police.

We continue to use our social media accounts on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram (@SeabrookNHPD) to connect with the public. This has proved to be an effective means of providing information to and interacting with the public. The Seabrookpd.com website has a Twitter feed at the bottom for people who do not utilize social media.

While we continue to limit our public interactions in order to maintain a healthy staff we look forward to resuming our regular Coffee with a Cop program as well as our other public outreach events as a means of connecting with residents. We appreciate the community support throughout 2020.

Despite the unprecedented challenges this year, Seabrook Police staff members continue to provide the community with a high level of service on a daily basis to include our continued participation in numerous drug and opioid reduction initiatives to combat the sale and distribution of illegal drugs in Seabrook and surrounding areas.

We are still hiring for full-time police officers and anyone wishing to pursue a career in law enforcement with the Seabrook Police Department can apply at PoliceApp.com.

Currently our Boys girls Travel teams are playing games at the RIM and practicing at the Community Center. If we were to have parents pick to play either In-House or Travel, it is highly likely all of the Travel players will pick Travel. That would decimate our in-house program. That is 40 players. It seems as though 40 wouldn't be bad, however we can't mix age groups like 2nd grade plays 8th graders. So, this would likely leave us with 1-3 teams per age group and that doesn't count for a "league". I think the best option would be to keep both and we will inform the parents for those players who only play In-House that there are players on their team that play Travel. Numbers and age groups below.

K-1 we have 16 players and 4 teams. The RIM does not affect this age group

 $2^{\sim}-3^{\sim}$  we have 32 players, 13 cheerleaders, and 4 teams (4 players are on teams that play at the RIM)

4"-5" we 34 players and 4 teams (17 players play on teams at the RIM)

6-8 we have 36 players and 4 teams (19 players are on teams at the RIM)

We are following state guidelines for Amateur and Youth Sports in order to ensure health and safety of people involved with the program. They were updated December 9, 2020.

In addition to the state guidelines we have put in some of the following guidelines at our facility:

We have reduced the amount of spectators 2 people per player. Max 50ish spectators and the players, coaches and staff.

The gym will be set up with seating that is socially distanced

Temperatures will be taken at the entrance of the building with the protocol questions being asked.

Only players and coaches may attend practices.


Schedule has been set up with 30 minutes between games and practices to sanitize the building.

There was some concern with how football and other sports were being played. All area sports whether in Seabrook or not have been running using State Guidelines. I know during football if someone tested positive on a team or there was possible exposure games were cancelled and protocols were followed. We will most certainly do this and we are relying on the RIM to follow the guidelines as well.

There is also potential that players are doing other activities such as music, drama, martial arts, hockey, soccer, volleyball, dance, boy scouts, girls scouts, etc. It would be difficult to "hunt" this information from each player.




Rocks Road Connection Seabrook, NH
